

Kent, Ohio



The Northeast Ohio Community of Kent was founded in 1805 as part of the

Connecticut Western Reserve.

Located approximately 12 miles northeast of Akron and 31 miles southeast of Cleveland, it has a population of 27,906. Within 15 miles the total population is 500,000.



Kent State University, founded in 1910, has an enrollment of more than 25,000 graduate and undergraduate students and is a major factor in the economy of the community. The University presently has approximately 3,150 full and part-time employees.

The community also has developed a substantial manufacturing sector, whose products include fractional horsepower motors, fasteners, machining-molds and floral foam products. The combination of a diverse industrial base and university-related employment has formed a stable economy.

Interstate 76, located 3 miles south of the city, and I-80 (Ohio Turnpike) 7 miles north, provide access to eastern and western markets. They also provide convenient access to commercial, passenger and freight air service at Akron-Canton Airport (25 miles) or Cleveland Hopkins Airport (45 miles). Private and corporate aircraft can use Kent State University Airport's 4,000 foot, hard-surfaced runway, 3 miles west of the city. Rail service is available from Norfolk Southern, CSX Transportation, and Wheeling & Lake Erie Railroad.

Kent offers its citizens downtown shopping facilities and three "community" plazas, which are supplemented by malls in the area. Because of its close proximity to Akron and Cleveland, the city's residents enjoy many diverse recreational and cultural opportunities both locally and in neighboring cities.

The local school system offers a sound educational program from kindergarten through high school, including vocational education. Kent State University and numerous other colleges and universities within driving distance offer a wide range of undergraduate and graduate programs to round out the educational opportunities.

A progressive city government working closely with the business community and the chamber of commerce has cultivated Kent's favorable business climate. Their combined efforts have resulted in a good mix of residential, commercial and industrial land for future sites and growth.
